The BSA Design Awards program celebrates exemplary innovation in the built environment, investment from committed clients, and the unique power of architecture to design buildings and spaces that transform communities and shape the way we live. The BSA honors projects that embody the values of the [AIA Framework for Design Excellence](#) and the BSA's vision of building a just and sustainable Boston, together.

Architecture is ever evolving. Architects play important roles in leveraging the power of design to create innovative processes and new design ideas that create positive social and environmental impact.

The **2023 BSA's Design Awards** program invites visions of varying scales and resources that **challenge practice, lead sustainability progress**, and **broaden conversations** about resilience in design.

- All building typologies are welcome in **BUILT DESIGN EXCELLENCE, SMALL FIRMS, or UNBUILT PLANNING & DESIGN** categories – However, awards may not be bestowed for every typology.
- The **SMALL FIRMS** category is eligible to firms of 10 or fewer employees.
- Accessibility and Sustainability are human rights that should be embedded in all design work.
- Juries will review narratives and design based on **IMPACT ADVANCEMENTS** of **social responsibility, technology excellence, and sustainability** that connect with our values and values of good design.
- The BSA Design Awards emphasize the AIA's Design Excellence criteria that are highlighted in the **COMMON APP** to evaluate zero-carbon, equitable, resilient, and healthy built projects.
- Innovation can be demonstrated at multiple levels. We encourage emerging ideas and theoretical projects that demonstrate the AIA's Design Excellence criteria from professionals and students for **UNBUILT PLANNING & DESIGN**.
- Celebrating 100 years in 2023, the **Harleston Parker Medal** celebrates the most beautiful piece of architecture, building, monument or structure within the City of Boston.

Project submission criteria emphasize a robust approach to **sustainability, social responsibility, and innovation.**

Projects may be recognized in these **Award Levels:**

Honor – Representing the highest level of achievement of Design Excellence

Merit – Representing exceptional design, performance, and intent work

Impact Advancement Commendations – May recognize projects that encompass the values of good design within the context of **social responsibility, technology excellence, and sustainability.**

Juries will be comprised of both BSA members and other AIA chapter representatives with expertise in different design and building types and experience levels.

Massachusetts Architectural Access Board Award Recognition

In collaboration with the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB), **BUILT DESIGN EXCELLENCE** and **SMALL FIRMS** submissions may be eligible for accessible design achievement for:

- A. Thomas P. Hopkins Memorial Award for public buildings and facilities to which Massachusetts statute 521 CMR applies.
- B. Private Residential Award for projects addressing an individual’s personal accessibility needs.
- C. William D. Smith Memorial Award for projects that integrate accessibility with historic preservation.

For residential or housing, and public and commercial buildings, entries may be for entire facilities or site-specific solutions, which might include exteriors (ramps, signage, campuses, landscape); interiors (entries, bathrooms, hardware, lifts, details); or buildings. Entries will be judged in part on effectiveness in integrating the specific access solution into the overall project design.

At the jury’s discretion, the number of awards and award recognition in any category may be given to as many or as few projects as are deemed worthy by the jury. The jury’s decisions are final and not subject to review.

Anyone meeting eligibility requirements may submit. Massachusetts AIA firm members receive special pricing.

Submissions are assessed for the degree to which the project meets the requirements, degrees of opportunity, constraint, and budget. It is important that submissions convey to the jury a full understanding of the project through the metrics narratives and design.

Project submissions criteria include a robust approach to sustainability and equity, as well as addressing environmental, social, and economic factors. Projects that contain attributes which successfully reduced the carbon footprint of the architecture, construction, or usage, should make every attempt to highlight those aspects within their entry submission.

Impact Advancements are explored by juries to understand the concepts and considerations that drive the values of good design. Your 250-word summary provides the opportunity to narrate your project's process and impact in one or more of the following:

Social Advancement – demonstrating a commitment to social progress by proposing new approaches to the development of architectural and/or urban form.

- *Community Engagement – an entire community and/or stakeholders are substantially involved and engaged in the decision-making processes, and community involvement influenced project outcomes.*
- *Community Benefit – project addresses a need(s) and demonstrates benefit(s) to the community.*
- *Economic Disparity – architecture or the design process has reduced disparities in the economics of the larger community or individuals served by the project.*
- *Health Outcomes – project improves health, safety, or well-being outcomes for the larger community or individuals served by the project.*
- *Educational Inequity – project addresses inequities in our education system and those that increase the social responsibility of education.*

Technical Advancement – exploring new technologies and/or their architectural applications

- *Technical elements of building design, including engineering achievements*
- *Technology that greatly improved collaboration, innovation, and creativity*
- *Technology that resulted in improved economic, environmental, or social outcomes of the project*

Environmental Advancement – demonstrating a commitment to environmentally sensitive design, sustainability and/or energy/resources conservation

- *Excellence in demonstrating ecological stewardship, including reduced environmental impact and reduced energy consumption, as well as attention to quality of life issues, resiliency, and community engagement within the environment.*
- *Demonstrating efforts to reduce energy use in occupancy of the building.*
- *Innovative solutions reducing embodied energy/carbon use in the building's design and construction.*

The number of awards granted shall be at the sole discretion of the juries. Additionally, juries may decide not to award projects every in category.

The BSA believes that innovation in the build environment is key to tackling the greatest challenges facing Boston, including the increasing threat of climate change. In recognition of the new ways architects are designing sustainable spaces, the BSA has incorporated the AIA Framework for Design Excellence measures through the **Common App**, which includes metrics for evaluating how projects respond to the urgency of climate change and promote sustainability, reduce carbon emissions, and promote healthy communities.

The BSA recognizes that some of the Framework's measures may be less relevant to a specific project, and that metrics may be difficult or impossible to acquire. A submission will not be penalized if the project's scope simply does not address a certain measure or if the design team and/or submitting personnel lack performance metrics. However, a submission may be viewed critically if the jury believes that a measure or question that should have been addressed was skipped. In other words, if the jury is believes that a project's design was or should have been impacted by a measure that is not included in the Design Awards submission, the jury may negatively assess the submission.

The Common App worksheet will be the first elements that the jury will see for every submission (Built Design Excellence and Small Firms).

- Not all 10 measures are required. However, it is important to demonstrate how the project performs above and beyond
- Each project will be reviewed by a Technical Review Jury within project types, who will assess each project's success in achieving sustainability decarbonization goals. Average scores, along with technical review comments, will be forwarded to the Design Jury. (Important note: providing incorrect information or failing to provide information may result in a lower technical review score; jurors are less likely to give awards to lower-scoring projects).
- All information shall be anonymous - no mention of the submitting firm, team or collaborators in any text.

If you do not have building performance data to share, do not leave the Common App field blank. Mark "NA" in the fields as needed. All built projects must provide performance data and narratives where requested on the Common App. Completing at least three descriptive and strategy narratives is required to ensure that the jury understands your approach.

****For Urban Design/Planning, "initiated" shall mean a completed or an incomplete project, where a significant portion has been completed, implemented, or adopted by a local jurisdiction, authority, institution, or private client.**

What jurors will not review?

- Entrant information—firm demographics and disadvantaged business enterprise certification
- Publicity and gallery images
- Design team/consultants credit list, including names and contact information.
- Affirmation of Intern Declaration Policy
- Affirmation of AIA Code of Ethics and Professional Conduct
- Consent to the BSA/AIA statement on equity, diversity, and inclusion
- Entry fee
