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Past, Present, Future-Decker Exhibition

October 27, 2020—December 31, 2020

(Boston, MA November 19, 2020)—The exhibition *Past, Present, Future-Decker* is part of an ongoing exploration and documentation of the ways in which existing triple-deckers have shaped the City of Boston, while inviting residents to envision the future of this iconic New England vernacular building typology: the future-decker. This exhibition invites visitors to explore residents' perspectives and experiences with triple-deckers and possible new ways to re-integrate them into the fabric of the city.

In this exhibition, visitors can learn about and better understand the existing and historical barriers that have made it difficult to create this form of middle-scale housing, as well as what changes would be necessary to bring their own versions of the future-decker to life. This work leads up to the BSA and iLab's upcoming Housing Innovation Competition, where participants will be asked to demonstrate that affordable "middle" housing typologies can help stitch together Boston's current and future housing landscape.

The Future-Decker exhibition is curated by Pat Falco, Boston Artist-in-Residence, and Wandy Pascoal, Housing Innovation Design Fellow at the Boston Society for Architecture and the City of Boston's Housing Innovation Lab. Both are focused on exploring new ideas and approaches in addressing Boston's housing needs, including the need [for middle-scale multifamily](#) housing for all.
